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

KTCEA's Common, Consistent Curriculum has themes for each season. For December to February, schools and teachers are exploring winter themes for lessons and with students. Topics include trapping, snaring, storytelling, ice-fishing, filleting and preserving fish, dog-sledding, winter shelters, making fires in winter, snowshoes and skis, outdoor fires, cooking outdoors, beading and sewing.

The Curriculum and Instruction team met with Elders from KTC Nations December 6, 2021 in Peace River to discuss land-based learning outcomes and curriculum in KTCEA schools. Some Elders made recordings for KTCEA-Radio.ca.

Land-based Learning and Curriculum Specialist, Jason Bigcharles was interviewed for the Indigenous Sports Council of Alberta's Community Spotlight Magazine in <u>November 2021</u>. The article featured the land-based learning programs and camps offered for KTCEA schools. Jason talked about the role of community Elders, knowledge keepers and leadership in developing and supporting this program for KTCEA schools and students.

Our curriculum has four pillars: **Leadership, Land-based Learning, Storytelling,** and **Healing.** October to December, teaching staff at all schools received training on how to use the KTCEA Common, Consistent Curriculum in their classes. Training was provided for principals, teachers, education assistants, and Cree language instructors.Sessions were led by Allan Langevin and Terry Lynn Cook.




mâmawi acimostâkîwi masinahikan 2020-2021 Community Report – Survey

Most parents agreed that KTCEA had made progress on Board priorities in 2020-2021.

Parents said the report gave them new information about many KTCEA programs but mostly about KTCEA's Common, Consistent Curriculum, Land-based Learning and Inclusive Education.



COVID-19 measures to keep KTCEA schools safe for students and staff:

- Masks are required for students grades 4-12 and are now recommended for K4-Grade 3.
- Schools provide a supply of two triple layer masks daily for K-12 students and teachers.
- There is a zero-tolerance policy is in place for sickness for staff/students. Staff or students with cold/flu symptoms must stay home.
- Staff or students who test positive must isolate for 10 days.
- Air purifiers with HEPA filters in classrooms at all schools.
- Weekly testing for all school staff each Monday at school and through rapid tests at home on Sundays and Wednesdays.
- Parents and families can request COVID-19 rapid test kits from schools or the local Health Centre.
- Vaccinations are now available for children aged 5 and over contact your local Health Centre.
- January updates to the KTCEA 2021-2022 School Safety Measures are on the <u>KTCEA</u> website.
